

Stay Prepared For An Unexpected Opportunity

Success is what happens when opportunity meets preparation.

Learn the Details

The margin between success and failure in the NFL, in most enterprises in fact, is so small that a little bit of information can make all the difference.

Success requires gathering as much information as possible from all possible sources, using it to determine both your own and your opponent's strengths against his weaknesses.

In the information-gathering process, every detail matters. No matter how much you learn, there will always be something more. As much time as the coaching staff spends working with the players on the practice field, we spend considerably more time accumulating knowledge from every possible source about our opponent. We study videotape, we read and reread scouting reports, we pour over statistics. We scout their games and speak to other coaches who have played them. Then we put it all together to create our strategy, our game plan.

Study the Numbers

Statistics are the language of football; numbers can describe teams and players in a tremendous detail.

The key is to understand the language of percentages, and to be able to find in it the most important tendencies.

Numbers without context can be very misleading... There is a reason for every statistic; understanding the why is essential.

Self-scouting enables us to identify our own strengths and weaknesses, as well as our tendencies.

A player who believes he is prepared is a confident player, and a confident player will play better.
